Mother Nature



The perching birds at Vista stayed in the bushes and trees. We were able to identify sparrows, an olive-sided flycatcher, black phoebes, and bushtits. A warbler could be heard beyond the row of eucalyptus, perhaps hiding in the long shed with the old engines. California towhees popped out of the bushes to peck and scratch at the ground. A dull brown bird reminding you of a small robin, they have long, dark tail feathers with rust color showing beneath their rumps. They peck, scratch, and peck some more at the ground reminding you of a small chicken. Towhees, black phoebes, and bushtits are here year-round as are the red-wing blackbirds, sparrows, hummingbirds, and red-tailed hawk.

Coyotes were heard close by at night giving their victory serenade, probably having caught one of the cottontails some of you were lucky enough to see. Fortunately, pet owners kept their furry friends in at night as our animals are no match for the wild ones. Also heard were western meadowlarks by day, but at night it was the frog chorus that got your attention. One night of light rain kept the dust down. Beyond the camping area, there is a marsh and you can see the trails worn through it by many of the larger creatures making their way across. Meanwhile, the red-wing blackbird males are scouting favorite reeds or cattails to use for perches while the drab females build their nests down in the stalks. As breeding season approaches, the male's red shoulder patches will become brighter, their calls more strident. They defend their territory while the female builds the nest, lays and sets on the eggs, and then raises the babies as well as keeping herself fed. How is that for division of labor?

A red-tailed hawk soared hundreds of feet up, riding a thermal, perhaps watching us several hundred feet below. Notably, there were fewer crows in camp this year. The tiniest animals seen were the sugar ants making tiny hills beneath our feet. Lucky for us, we didn't hear of any RV invasions. The most unusual thing we saw on the walk was a very healthy artichoke plant on the south side of the spread-out camping area. Nearby there were two baby plants. Should you come to the Vista Antique Steam and Gas Engine Museum in June during their tractor days, please check these plants out to see if they bloom providing thistle seeds for the finches (unless the pod is harvested first).

Six of my turtles came to camp this month. Four are tiny... baby three-toed eastern box turtles weighing a magnificent 0.2 ounces each, born in my yard in Long Beach about October 1st. They are native to the southeast and like damp areas like moist leaves under a tree. One was a male Russian tortoise at 1 1/4 lbs. Gretsky "woke up" too early due to our crazy warm weather. Tortoises are dry land turtles. They have thick shells and are not able to pull their heads all the way in, let alone their legs, and as such are vulnerable to predators such as the raccoon that did get my largest turtle's left front leg. Tammy was the sixth turtle here with me. Being a red-eared slider, she has to be kept damp or wet. Tammy weighs in at 3 lbs. 5oz. She eats in the water and loves meal worms, pieces of chicken or tuna, and fresh ground meat. I heard her being called "Tripod" because of the lack of one foot. She is recovering well from her trauma and will be able to stay outdoors again when the evenings warm up.
